## High-quality books

Your child will be sent home with a Little Wandle Letters and Sounds phonics reading book (N-Y2) or Little Wandle fluency book (Y2-4.) These are used each day in school and so must come back into school for lessons to proceed.

#### Teachers will inform you of the days that these come home.

In addition, children will choose a free-choice library book for enjoyment as a family read. As children progress through the school, they will also have access to a wide range of age-related reading texts to help build comprehension skills. Your child may also be given a Collins Hub login to access an online text.

# Supporting your child

- It is expected that you read with your child at home as much as possible
- Log your child's reading in their reading diary so that they can access school rewards (Dojo for reading at least 3 times at home)
- Ask your child questions as they read to check their understanding
- Ask them about books/ stories they are reading at school and about different authors. Remember that reading also includes poetry and non-fiction etc.
- Your child will visit our school library to choose their reading for pleasure book.
- Reading records are checked every Friday by your child's class teacher
- Every class engages in story time at the end of the day and children often vote which books they would like read to them from a collection of age-appropriate texts for their year group.
